Maths

This term has been dominated by all of the exams our students have taken. We had a staggering 23 students sit their iGCSE in Maths, and 1 student sat a GCSE in Statistics. Many more have taken Functional skills exams and I'm looking forward to them continuing their focus and progress in September.

I am incredibly proud of all of the students at Norton College for their commitment to lessons and their desire to better themselves.

Science at Norton College

Summer term is always busy at Norton College, and Science is no exception! A record 11 students sat GCSE exams in Biology, Chemistry and Physics this term, and 10 additional students achieved Entry Level Science or Further Entry Level Science this year. We are looking to beat those numbers next year too, with 15 students already signed up to do GCSE Sciences next academic year.

We place a real emphasis on practicals in Science, and Steph and Holly work hard to make Science lessons fun and engaging. In Entry Level, students set up chromatography and distillation experiments, making predictions and explaining the results in scientific language. All the students enjoy burning food in GCSE Biology in order to calculate the amount of energy in different foodstuffs, and who doesn't love burning alcohols to investigate combustion in GCSE Chemistry?!

We are seeing a rise in the number of students engaging in GCSE Physics now too, with massive credit given to the Maths department for this, as students need to be working towards GCSE Maths before they can start GCSE Physics.

Living Eggs returned at the start of the summer term, and students had further opportunities to watch eggs hatching and chicks developing. It was wonderful to see the gentle side of many of our students emerging, as they handled the newly hatched chicks with care, hushing anyone who made too much noise.

Steph & Luke are hoping to develop Engagement Science further next academic year, to allow all students regular opportunities to take part in exciting Science activities.



First of all we are really proud of the progress our students have made in English this year, especially all those students who have taken exams from Functional Skills through to iGCSE. We eagerly await the iGCSE results in August.

We are also pleased to announce some changes within the English department and are delighted to welcome back Megan Hill following her maternity leave. Sadly, although we are losing Orla from the English team, we are not losing her from the college and we wish her every success in her new role as a Pastoral Support Assistant.

We are looking forward to implementing the Accelerated Reader programme when we return in September, as we continue to develop reading across the college.

Student feedback has highlighted the need for an improved reading area in college and there will be some work carried over the summer holidays to develop a new and bigger library area. Students will be encouraged to use the area for reading and quiet study. We are looking to increase the variety of texts available to students and welcome any recommendations.





Norton College Mock Election

Where are they now...

My name is Anthony and I attended Norton College Worcester from 2018 till 2021. Prior to attending Norton, I was in a local mainstream high school, where I struggled to access any form of education or social development. During my time in a mainstream provision, I would be disruptive, constantly get in to trouble, only attending school on a part time timetable and failed to make any real academic progress.

When I moved to Norton College, I felt welcomed and understood for the first time. I benefited from the 1:1 teaching, flexibility built into my timetable, support from helpful staff and social skills gained from trips out.

From Norton College I gained multiple qualifications including Btecs, GCSEs and external vocational qualifications. The benefit of passing these recognised qualifications has allowed me to move on in adult life and gain full time employment.

I am really grateful for all the help and support I received from Norton College. If it wasn't for Norton, then I would not be where I am today. I have a full-time job, a car and excellent prospects for the future.

Humanities





Humanities students will have completed their work on religious festivals and celebrations by the end of July. Some of them have earned enough credits that they have now completed a Certificate in Entry Level Humanities. Whilst some are gaining an Award.

8 to 12 Credits = Award

13+ Credits = Certificate

Humanities is a fantastic way of broadening students' horizons and is essential within the multi-cultural society we live in. Students studied Diwali which is a Hindu festival celebrated over five days in late October/early November. It is a time to worship deities and for spiritual reflection, also known as the Festival of Lights.

It is also a time to spend with friends and family, giving and receiving presents, fireworks and delicious food. It is such a fantastic festival that Indian Sikhs, Buddhists and Muslims celebrate it too.





Students also studied Holy Week, which is the week leading up to Easter Sunday. It starts with Palm Sunday when Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a Donkey, welcomed with palm leaves. Maundy Thursday marks the Last Super when Jesus ate with his disciples for the last time when he broke bread and drank wine, which is why we have Holy Communion today. Good Friday saw the crucifixion of Jesus and his death, but it is Easter Sunday that is the most important event on the Christian calendar. This is because of his resurrection and the empty tomb.

It shows that Jesus defeated death, and it is considered by many Christians to be proof of life after death. Many Christians also think of Jesus' resurrection as evidence of God's omnipotent and omnibenevolent nature.

Sister Jessica has made two visits this term and she talked about Holy Week to some of our students and how important it is to her faith. We also visited the monastery, which is a place of tranquillity.









We visited the Think Tank in Birmingham and travelled by train to get there.
